One Semester, General Elective (5 Credits) | No prerequisites | Taught completely in English

This course is a study of the interactions between language, culture and personal identity. Students examine culture as a set of learned expectations, values, and behaviors of people. Students will have opportunities to experience language, music, celebrations, food, art, and customs as products of some of the world's cultures. Students will explore various media and materials from across the world. Students work throughout the semester to answer the questions: What is culture? And How does my culture affect the way I see myself and the world around me?

- Understand culture as a set of beliefs, values, expectations, and customs


